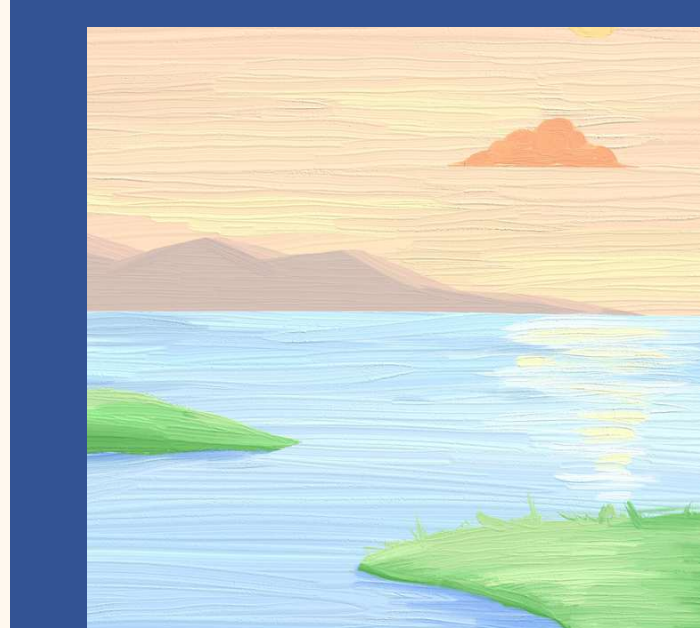


**Someday I may visit the

I will see signs that teach me about the estuary and its wildlife.



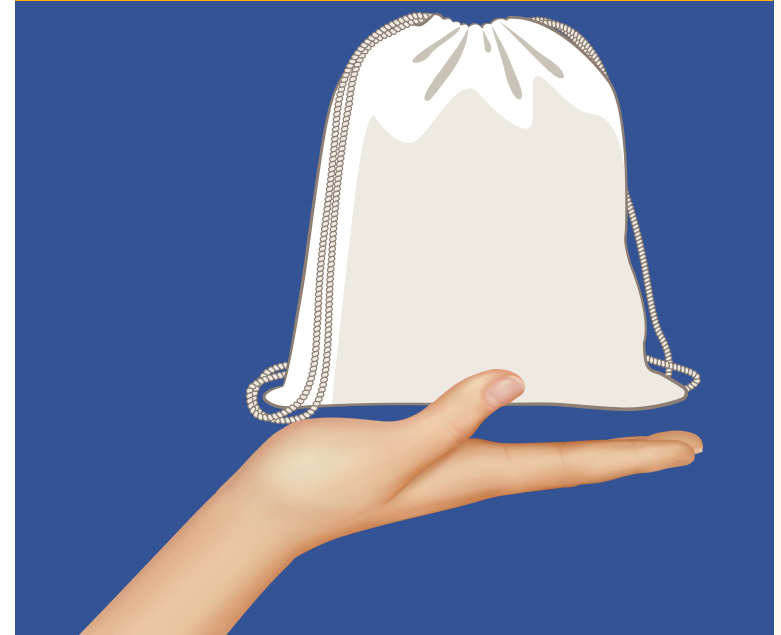
Wild animals live in the estuary. I can stay safe by staying on the trail and giving animals space.
